

Farmers grants are \$1,140,000

WINNIPEG — Agriculture Minister Sam Uskiw has announced that during the past five years, 7,900 farmers have received a total of \$1,140,000 in federal-provincial grants to help finance the

installation of outdoor sewer and water facilities under Manitoba's farm sewer and water services program. Mr. Uskiw also noted that farmers saved at least \$500,000 on purchases of materials costing nearly \$2 million. Farmers made these savings by taking advantage of the program's bulk purchasing scheme adminis-

tered by his department's rural water services division. Under this scheme, farmers may order equipment through the division which then purchase it in bulk. The chief items supplied to date have been pressure systems, plastic pipes and watering systems.

As for the grants, Mr. Uskiw said these cover 15 per cent of the eligible costs incurred by farmers installing outdoor sewer and water facilities, up to \$300 per farmstead and \$200 for each additional dwelling. Eligible costs include all material and labor expenses for well testing, outdoor livestock water distribution, filters, waters, piping to waters and related electric wiring.

Mr. Uskiw said the basic purpose of the program is to assist farmers to install modern pressure systems which are a basic requirement for farmstead mechanization and livestock production which is tied in to his department's agricultural div-

ersification program and the province's stay option policy for rural Manitoba.

He said the rural technicians have proven very useful in providing farmers with layouts for water and sewerage systems. The design, which indicates the types, locations and sizes of pumps, pipes and other materials required to install the system, is guaranteed by the rural water services division if the materials, specified were used and installed as specified.

The federal government cost-shares the grants and technical advisory services provided by the program under the ARDA (50-50 with the province) and FRED (60-40 federal-provincial) agreements. The bulk material purchase segment is strictly a provincial program.

Mr. Uskiw also announced that \$10,500 in federal-provincial grants have been provided to approximately 20 farmers in the past year to develop water supply and

delivery systems from sources other than wells, dugouts or dammed ponds located on the farmstead.

The money has been used to help finance the purchase of such items as water pressure systems, plastic,

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pipes and watering devices such as hydrants & livestock watering bowls.

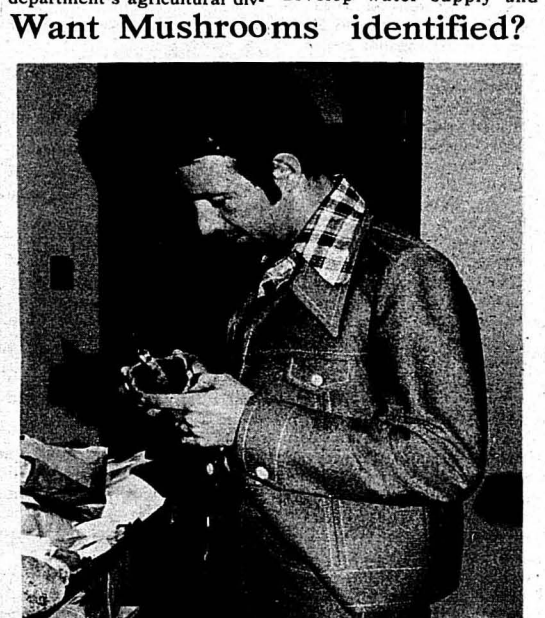

Not all mushrooms that grow in the local yards are edible. The "Fly Agaric" mushroom produces hallucinations similar to those experienced in the mushroom cults. Another kind, the "Destroying Angel," is a killer; symptoms do not

appear for eight hours and by then the liver may have been irreparably damaged. However, according to Professor Jackson, the majority of mushrooms are not poisonous.

People on the Brandon area may bring samples to the university for testing. Fungi, if mailed, must first be dried, and it should be accompanied by such information as where it was picked and its colour and smell before being dried.

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Loss of the railway did not hurt Wawota

RESTON—The loss of the railway has not had a harmful effect on the Town of Wawota, Sask., Lee Jackson told the Recorder on Saturday, in fact it has gained about 200 in population since the railway was pulled up he stated.

Wawota was located on the Reston — Wolseley which was abandoned and removed several years ago.

Mr. Jackson who operates Lee's Lumber Ltd., a Chimo outlet stated that aggressive businessmen had been the reason the Town had advanced. He said that two implement dealers in town were aggressive and served a large area. In his own business he did business within a 75 mile range.

Certainly when farmers deliver grain to a centre they are going to buy some goods there, Lee stated, but this hasn't been a big thing. The town has the solid support of farmers within a two mile radius, and of course a much larger district for some of the services offered by the town.

Mr. Jackson came to Reston about ten years ago and was manager of the Beaver Lumber Yard here. He left the company to establish his own business.

Mr. Jackson said that one thing Wawota lacked was a weekly newspaper.

New policy for sale of lots in Reston

RESTON—A new policy for the sale of municipal owned property in the Reston U.V.D. was adopted at a meeting of the R. M. of Pipestone council held on Thursday, July 8th.

The new regulations reads as follows:

Now Therefore be it resolved that the following rules be established:

a) the option shall be in the form attached
b) the time limits for section 3 of the option will be 3 months for the period from April 1 to September 30, 9 months for the period from October 1 to December 31,
6 months for the period from January 1 to March 31
c) no optionee shall be granted more than 4-26 foot lots or 2-50 foot lots at one time.

During the option period a start must be made on building a structure.

Lots are in demand in both Reston and Sinclair and by-laws passed selling the

following lots:

In Reston: East 50 feet of block 31 plan 860 to Donna Elizabeth Klusendorf; Lots 1 and 2, block 23, plan 216 to William Albert Elliott; South 25 feet of lot 19 and lot 20, block 9, plan 117 to John Anson Berry; Lot 16, block 24, plan 216 to Arthur Ashcroft; Lots 6 and 7, block 25, plan 216 to Wilma Louise Williamson; Lots 1 to 12 were sold to Mrs. Baldwin Kemkaran.

In Sinclair: Lots 20 and 21, block 3, plan 115 to Wayne Thordarson; Lots 13, 14 and 15, block 1, plan 135 to Reg Bartel; Lots 18 and 19, block 3, plan 155 to Don Westbrook; Lots 7 and 8, block 2, plan 135 to Clarence Davis.

A number of lots were optioned in Reston as follows: Lot 7, block 11, plan 154 to Cliff Smith; Lots 8 to 11, block 11, plan 154 to Alvin Lazenby; Lots 6 and 7, block 24, plan 216 to Wilma Williamson; Lots 4 and 5, block 25, plan 216 to Ken Zelmer; Lot 17, block 24, plan 216 to Keith Mann.

Council expressed concern over the fact that the feasibility study for the installation of a sewer system in Pipestone was being delayed and in a resolution suggested that the study should not be delayed until a health problem arises. The resolution asks that the feasibility study be carried out this year.

The council will no longer drag or snowplow the roads in the Oak Lake Indian Reserve it was decided. The decision came about because the municipality have not been paid for roads that they constructed in the Reserve.

A request was received to clean out the big ravine through sections 21, 22 and 23-7-26 but council decided that this was the responsibility of the land owners.

The following resolution to be forwarded to the province received unanimous endorsement by the council:

"Whereas PR255 from the No. 83 highway to PR254 is

in a deplorable condition and PR254 from No. 2 highway to Oak Lake Resort is not open to traffic;

And Whereas the traffic to Oak Lake Resort from the south-west corner of Manitoba has to travel to No. 1 highway to get into the lake;

Now Therefore be it resolved that the Council of the Rural Municipality of Pipestone request PR254 from No. 2 to Oak Lake be opened as soon as possible;

And Further it be resolved that the Council of the Rural Municipality of Pipestone request that PR255 from Cromer to PR254 be paved and PR254 from No. 2 to Oak Lake Resort be paved."

Hourly rates for the various municipal machines were set as follows: For municipal work: Patrols \$13.00 for dragging and snowplowing, \$15.10 for construction; Komatsu \$18.50; Cat D1E \$17.30; Cat D7E \$18.50; JD860A \$22.00; M.F. tractor \$9.50.

Custom work (retroactive to May 1, 1976): Patrols \$15.25 for maintenance, \$19.35 for construction, \$16.60 for maintenance in winter; \$17.95 for using ice blade, \$24.85 for snowplowing; Komatsu D85A and dozer \$26.05 and \$4.95; Cat D7E and No. 70, \$22.50 and \$7.80; Cat D7F and No. 435, \$26.50 and \$9.00; JD860A \$41.45, No. 60, \$6.00; M.F. tractor and mower \$8.70 and \$4.00.

Other actions at the meeting included:

• Accepted title to lot 11, block 3, plan 155 in Sinclair.
• Placed Government of Canada bonds in the amount of \$49,000 as collateral against a bank loan.

• Turned the ambulance grant of \$1,260 received from the province over to Hospital District No. 10.

• Authorized a further grant of \$376 to the Virden Veterinary Clinic.

• Declared Thursday, July 22 and Monday, August 3rd to be Civic Holidays.

Reeve Carl Wedow occupied the chair and all council members were in attendance.

In addition to the dancers there were many from distant places who came just to renew friendships. The PowWow grounds, which are between the Band Office and the Presbyterian Church were well filled with tents and campers.

Jack Cassidy of Buelah acted as master of ceremonies for the event and Gloria Eastman, of the Oak Lake Band was the secretary.

Prior to the dancing finals on Sunday evening, Frank Eastman, chief of the Oak Lake Band and Mrs. Eastman presented gifts to some of the visitors in appreciation of

their coming to take part in the event.

Among those attending were Indians from Arizona, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Oklahoma, South and North Dakota in the United States and from the provinces of Saskatchewan, Ontario and Manitoba.

The eight groups of singers and drummers who provided the beat for the dancing came from: Sioux Valley, Man., Fort Qu'Appelle, Sask., Broadview, Sask., Whitefish Bay, Ont., Fort Totten, N. D., White Bear (Carlyle) Sask., Piapot, Sask., and from the Oak Lake Band.

Centennial of Oak Lake Reserve is next year

PIPESTONE — Next year will be the Centennial year for the Oak Lake Indian Reserve, Chief Frank Eastman stated during the presentation ceremony on Sunday evening. He said that the occasion would be marked by a bigger Pow Wow and planning was starting immediately for the event.

The members of the Oak

Lake Band are descendants of a group of Sioux Indians that came to Canada following the Custer Massacre on June 25th, 1876 in the State of Montana. (In history when the Indians won a battle it was a Massacre, when the white won, it was a victory).

According to the booklet "Pioneers of the Pipestone" written by Mrs. T. A. Bulloch, the Sioux that fled to Canada following the Custer incident were led by the famous Chief Sitting Bull and many of them settled in Saskatchewan but a band came to the Pipestone Valley and camped for about two years near the Mayberry farm before moving to the reserve straight north of Pipestone.

John Wakpa, was the leader of this band and was a fine friend of the early settlers. Another member of the band, Icimana was just the opposite and was reputed to have carried a string of seven scalps of white men to attest to his hatred of the whites. It was also stated that during the Reil Rebellion in

1885, Icimana tried to persuade the Pipestone Band to go on the warpath and kill the white settlers in the district but John Wakpa used his influence to keep them from doing so. John died in 1886.

Among members of the band who have now gone to their reward, but are remembered by the older residents of the area are Charlie Cuuiyukoa and his wife Winona who lived for more than fifty years on the reserve.

For many years they came to Reston by horse and wagon, which they would tether behind the G. S. Munro Co. store.

Among the senior members of the Band now residing on the Reserve are Ken Eastman Sr., who is 86. He was chief of the Band for a number of years and is the father of Chief Frank Eastman.

Other well known senior residents include Jim Chaske, John Starr and George High Eagle.



Richard Lyons, of 711 North Boche, Thunder Bay, Ont., was one of the dancers taking part in the Pow Wow at the Oak Lake Indian Reserve on the weekend. Mr. Lyons is a member of the Ojibway tribe and the colorful traditional costume includes a breast plate of hollow bones and headress of feathers & quills.



Dorothy Brave Eagle, a Oglala Sioux of Pine Ridge, South Dakota, is also dressed in traditional garb, which was worn before the coming of the white man, with her dress being of buckskin. Much of her costume was handed down from her ancestors, she told the Recorder.



Dawn Brave Eagle, daughter of Dorothy Brave Eagle is wearing a dress belonging to the "trade period" which followed the coming of the white man. The material is cloth which was obtained from the traders and the decorations are elk's teeth. Her mother made the costume for her daughter.

It was on July 27th, 1905 that the first Reston Recorder rolled off the press and we quote a portion of the salutatory:

"Reston is one of Manitoba's best towns. Its prosperity and progress, within the last few years, is known far and wide. The wholesale people speak of Reston as one of the best places for business in the west. The trading done in the town is enormous, business is drawn from considerable distances in all directions. The growth of the town is but a criteria of the rapid settlement and advancement of the surrounding country.

"Reston will keep on growing. The great district tributary to the town, its growing importance as juncton of the Wolseley Branch of the C.P.R. and its well established firms, will aid its further development. To add to these the grand nature of the soil, its productiveness, its great stretch, and one cannot but draw the inference that such a district, owned and settled by progressive up to date farmers, will warrant still further growth of the town.

"With each progress comes new enterprise. To the progress of the town, the prosperity of the surrounding country and the push and enterprise of its men of business, the Reston Recorder, owes its birth. In such a town, surrounded by such a district, it cannot, if properly conduct-

ed, but reap the publishers a degree of remuneration. We hope and believe that it will aid in the development of the town and surrounding country"

That was on page one of the newly born Reston Recorder published by Manning Bros., the late Frank, father of the present publisher and the late Arthur J., both school teachers by profession. The latter soon returned to the teaching profession being principal of the Reston School for many years and later a school inspector. Frank continued to publish the Recorder until his death in 1943 and A. J., who had retired returned to Reston and assisted Mrs. J. D. Ready get out the paper and when the present publisher returned from overseas he continued to assist them both, until his death.

While Reston did not develop as much as possibly the founders had hoped, the Recorder has managed to survive over these years, its prosperity matching that of the district. It is a tribute to the late Frank Manning that it survived during the depression years, but did so by taking food stuffs and wood in barter on subscriptions as one means of feeding a family and keeping the enterprise going.

Whether it has aided in the development of the town and surrounding country, over the years, we will leave to others to decide.

Legal service is offered

WINNIPEG—The Westman Community Legal Services office, based at Brandon, has provided legal assistance to more than 3,400 persons in western Manitoba since it was established last August, according to Ron Meyers, executive director of the Legal Aid Services Society of Manitoba.

Mr. Meyers said 1,199 persons involved in more complicated and serious legal cases requiring a formal court presentation were awarded legal aid certificates while another 2,225 persons, with less serious legal problems, were provided duty counselling assistance.

About two-thirds of the legal aid certificates were handled by private lawyers in western Manitoba who have agreed to have their names placed on the legal aid panel thereby making themselves available to the legal aid program. The remaining certificates were handled by staff lawyers.

In addition to those receiving legal aid certificates and duty counselling assistance, said Mr. Meyers, 1,694 persons received advice on a wide variety of matters ranging from clarification of legal rights to referrals to appropriate government departments.

Mr. Meyers emphasized that, while based in Brandon, the Westman Community Legal Services office serves the entire Western Judicial District primarily through its outreach program which involves dispatching lawyers to various communities in the region to represent legal aid clients in court cases and to advise local residents.

Legal aid lawyers are made available in all of the regular criminal court and juvenile court sittings in the Western Judicial District.

This outreach program has been further assisted by a para-legal worker who has been hired through the New Careers program to visit the outlying districts, particularly the numerous Indian reservations in this region.

"Our increase in the number of people we have been seeing has put some constraints on our time," according to Brian Giesbrecht, director of the Westman office and area director of the Western Judicial District. "However, we hope that with our new para-legal worker we will be able to continue increasing the service offered to the out-lying districts in the Westman region."

Mr. Giesbrecht also noted that Westman Legal Services will be teaching basic law courses at the Assiniboine Community College and at Brandon University.

Although anyone is entitled to consult one of the three staff lawyers and one articling law student for general information, individuals seeking specific legal assistance in a court action must indicate they are

financially eligible for free legal aid.

The financial eligibility criteria is as follows: a maximum annual gross income of \$6,600 for a single person, \$7,515 for a family of \$8,250 for three, \$8,995 for four, \$9,710 for five, \$10,930 for six and \$12,125 for seven.

However, the guidelines are sufficiently flexible so that families with substantial debts or facing other adverse circumstances could earn an income above the normal maximum range and still be eligible for free legal aid.

Prof. L. C. Buchanan of the department of agricultural engineering at the University of Manitoba has found that giving pigs regular showers (spray cooling) results in cleaner, happier pigs which show a slight increase in performance when compared to unsprayed animals.

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The financial eligibility criteria is as follows: a maximum annual gross income of \$6,600 for a single person, \$7,515 for a family of \$8,250 for three, \$8,995 for four, \$9,710 for five, \$10,930 for six and \$12,125 for seven.

However, the guidelines are sufficiently flexible so that families with substantial debts or facing other adverse circumstances could earn an income above the normal maximum range and still be eligible for free legal aid.

Legal service is offered

WINNIPEG—The Westman Community Legal Services office, based at Brandon, has provided legal assistance to more than 3,400 persons in western Manitoba since it was established last August, according to Ron Meyers, executive director of the Legal Aid Services Society of Manitoba.

Mr. Meyers said 1,199 persons involved in more complicated and serious legal cases requiring a formal court presentation were awarded legal aid certificates while another 2,225 persons, with less serious legal problems, were provided duty counselling assistance.

About two-thirds of the legal aid certificates were handled by private lawyers in western Manitoba who have agreed to have their names placed on the legal aid panel thereby making themselves available to the legal aid program. The remaining certificates were handled by staff lawyers.

In addition to those receiving legal aid certificates and duty counselling assistance, said Mr. Meyers, 1,694 persons received advice on a wide variety of matters ranging from clarification of legal rights to referrals to appropriate government departments.

Mr. Meyers emphasized that, while based in Brandon, the Westman Community Legal Services office serves the entire Western Judicial District primarily through its outreach program which involves dispatching lawyers to various communities in the region to represent legal aid clients in court cases and to advise local residents.

Legal aid lawyers are made available in all of the regular criminal court and juvenile court sittings in the Western Judicial District.

This outreach program has been further assisted by a para-legal worker who has been hired through the New Careers program to visit the outlying districts, particularly the numerous Indian reservations in this region.

"Our increase in the number of people we have been seeing has put some constraints on our time," according to Brian Giesbrecht, director of the Westman office and area director of the Western Judicial District. "However, we hope that with our new para-legal worker we will be able to continue increasing the service offered to the out-lying districts in the Westman region."
